Hutchinson (4th generation):								



	<p>“To preserve some things from the past so that future generations will know how people lived and worked in those bygone days.”</p> <p>Upon its designation as one of Colorado’s Most Endangered Places in 2003, the Hutchinson Homestead started undergoing the preservation of its century-old buildings. In meeting this vision, Dr. Hutchinson donated the Homestead to the Town of Poncha Springs in 2006. After 12 years of meticulous rehabilitation, the property opened to the public in 2013. Salida Area Parks, Open Space and Trails, the Hutchinson Family and the Town of Poncha Springs have worked together to preserve the historic homestead, outbuildings and corrals. With funding support from History Colorado State Historical Fund and the National Park Service Save America’s Treasures Grant Program, the 140-year old buildings have been preserved and transformed into a place where the public can learn about pioneering history and the evolution of high altitude ranching.”</p>	
8. Connection to Historic Preservation	<p>Dr. Wendell Hutchinson had a vision to preserve and protect the Homestead for future generations. As part of this effort, Dr. Hutchinson donated the Homestead to the town of Poncha Springs in 2006. This donation was the start of a long and persistent journey in the preservation of the Homestead as a testament to the unique characteristics of the ranch. The ranch was listed in the National Register of Historic Places in 2009.</p> <p>Before restoration began in 2005, the 1870’s Homestead and outbuildings, none of which had foundations, were in such a state of deterioration that they were nominated to the Colorado’s List of Endangered Places in 2003. After multiple phases of restoration funded primarily by state preservation funds, the main Homestead House has a new foundation and is completely restored on the exterior. All ten outbuildings are stabilized and completely rehabilitated.</p> <p>Today, the site is alive and considered a “save” as an endangered place in Colorado. As people enter the ranch yard, they will experience what frontier life was like a century ago. The interior of the Homestead is being restored with period wallpaper and linoleum. Lilacs, apple and willow trees that have been on the ranch</p>	

	since the late 1800's are being pruned and grafts taken, a myriad of fences and corrals are being rehabilitated, and visitor pathways are being installed to create a meaningful experience for heritage tourists.

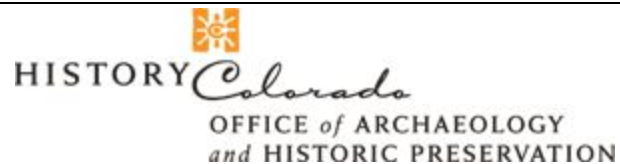
